CDF Funds CROCC 2020

The Cascade ROC Conference (CROCC) for 2020 received a generous \$1,000 donation from the <u>Cooperative Development Fund's</u> Cooperative Education Fund. This conference brings the leaders of Resident Owned Communities from Oregon and Washington together for an intensive one-day training in best practices for governance and cooperative practices.

The **Cooperative Education Fund** supports cooperative research, sponsors cooperative education events and scholarships, and develops cooperative education materials and programs. The Fund provides about \$100,000 in grants annually. The Fund is a project of the <u>Cooperative Development Foundation</u> (CDF), a public charity headquartered in Washington, DC that promotes and develops cooperatives to improve economic opportunities for all.

Co-ops Reopening Amid New Push for Human Dignity



As many counties in Washington and Oregon, including Thurston, entered into Phase 2 of the re-opening plan just as protests and furor over the police-killing of George Floyd swept the nation and the world. Co-ops in our community responded both to the needs of their members and their community.

- Burial Grounds re-opened on June 10th and then participated in the General Strike on June 12th called by Black Lives Matter.
- Orca Books Coop completes its move to its new location, but is also encouraging their members to shop at black owned book stores and is turning a percentage of the proceeds of its moving sale to local BLM bail funds.
- Central Co-op in Seattle closed in honor of BLM on June 12 with workers receiving pay for the day and has been highlighting black owned producers and partners in their store.
- New Moon Cafe also re-opened for business and joined Burial Grounds and Orca Books in providing safe spaces for demonstrators during the on-going protests.

Board Leadership Training for Homecare Co-ops

NWCDC launched its first Board Leadership Training for Washington Homecare co-ops. Board members from all four homecare co-ops, as well as from a new homecare co-op in development, are participating in the training. We hope the sessions of Co-op Governance, Policy Development, Effective Meetings and Member Engagement will give Board members the leadership skills they need to take their co-ops to the next level and beyond!

Opportunity to Purchase

Grace Lee,a Master's in Public Administration Graduate student at The Evergreen State College, has been researching limited equity housing co-ops, housing land trusts, and opportunity to purchase law in collaboration with NWCDC. Grace recently wrapped up her final capstone projectwhere she coordinated a community forum on creating an opportunity to purchase ordinance in Olympia. Such an ordinance would give tenant organized co-ops, and other eligible organizations a first right of refusal in purchasing their housing properties when they come up for sale. This would change the landscape for affordable housing preservation and housing co-op/land trust development in Olympia. Grace has created an open-source website and youtube presentation that will be used as an educational tool to support the progress of an opportunity to purchase initiative in Olympia. We think you will enjoy her 20 min presentation and project website which presents her compiled research. We thank Grace for her dedication to this ongoing work which will aid us in our advocacy efforts moving forward.
